

# THE LONG RANGERS

Over the last decade or so, our church has done some rather remarkable things. Of course we have sent to heaven almost a generation of faithful people who have served the Lord and this church in many and various ways. I personally miss dearly many of them. No one can ever take their place—just as no one can take our place. We may perform similar functions, but each of us is unique and blessed in God's sight.



God has blessed us with many ministry opportunities in recent memory. Highlights of our missions work include: a growing Book Carnival, the refurbishing of a water well and the building of a new water well in Kenya, East Africa, and an adult mission trip to McCurdy Methodist School in New Mexico. We ensure many local things as well through our "One Mile Mission." Some of these many things include the continued growth of the Backpack Ministry at Wimbish Elementary and the Big Hope mentoring program at

Webb Elementary. There are always steady outreach programs including food teams at the Arlington Life Shelter, Operation Christmas Child (and subsequent programs like it), and Kairos Prison Ministry—which has seen expansion and growth as well adding new congregation members to the teams or expanding to serve more people. We minister to older adults through activities organized by Away We Go. In all, congregation members have heard the message of Jesus to reach out and have put it into practice. Praise to our God!

Yet it is time to plan for the next steps in our congregation's life. As our neighborhood changes and a new generation arrives onto the scene, we need to plan for ways that we as a church can impact our community for the gospel. Many in our culture today care little for others or their problems and only want to know what we will do for them. It reminds me of something John F. Kennedy once articulated to our nation: "And so, my fellow Americans: ask not what your country can do for you—ask what you can do for your country." The same thing might be asked of us with respect to the church. The church is God's best incarnation of the Kingdom of God among us. Thus, we have a golden opportunity

to plan to see how our church can rise to this challenge. We have many resources here by which to share the gospel of God.

This coming year of 2016, we will take a look at many matters that will help us plan for our congregation's future. We will retain things that have worked in the past as we were broadcasting the gospel in our context; we will discard those things that perhaps worked once, but no longer are effective in today's public climate. For while the gospel never changes, it is true that the contexts into which we introduce the gospel are ever changing. Some of the things that are on the table for consideration are how we remain enthusiastic and positive as we continue to focus on mission and service to our community and the world.



Our church direction over the years has been decided by lay leadership and clergy committed to achieving the goals of the church. We desire to have church leadership diverse in terms of experience, economic levels, generational, and cultural tiers. We want to encourage many places where church folk participate in the congregation's leadership. As far as we are concerned, the more active committees, the better.



## FUMCA'S VISION FOR ADVENT AND CHRISTMAS 2015

If you pull out a hymnal in one of our pews and turn to page 880, you'll find The Nicene Creed, an ancient summary of the Christian faith. We have a later edition of it in our hymnal (it maybe a surprise to many that it wasn't written originally in English); it's a document that early church toiled over for decades and is the product of two ecumenical councils of the church (in 325 and later in 381). While the early church may have tried hard to remain as one, various beliefs in who Jesus was, and just plain-old geography, had the church divided—in a way not unsimilar to the Christian church of today.

As a way to solidify the church across the continents, the ecumenical councils were called, bringing together bishops from Europe, Africa, the Middle-East, and Asia to try to figure out—at least a little bit—what we actually believed about Jesus, the Bible, and the very nature of God.

What we get from the Nicene Creed is a beautiful poem, especially as it talks about Jesus Christ.

*We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,  
the only Son of God,  
eternally begotten of the Father,  
God from God, Light from Light,  
true God from true God  
begotten, not made,  
of one Being with the Father;  
through him all things were made.*

Beautiful, right? A picture of Jesus not just as we have come to know him, as our walking talking savior, but as a part of God that was with God from the very beginning of all things. As we look towards Advent, though, the next part of the creed as something special for us:

*For us and for our salvation  
he came down from heaven,  
was incarnate from the Holy Spirit  
and the Virgin Mary  
and became truly human.*

That's the ministry of what we've come to call the incarnation—this inexplicable event where God, in order to show us just how much God loves us, became fully human, fully incarnate, in Jesus Christ, the very Son of God, who came from heaven to earth - for us.

When we start our Advent season on November 29, we'll hear from the prophet Jeremiah, another theologian who toiled over God's meaning, an Israelite watching his country scatter into the wind. In all of that, God would give him a word of hope, "The time is coming declares the Lord, when I will fulfill my gracious promise with the people of Israel and Judah..." We, today, know that the promise will be fulfilled in the Promised One—Our Lord, Jesus Christ.

Theologians can talk all day long, but what really matters is this: God loves us, and God sent us Jesus, Light from Light, True God from True God.

If you're family is anything like mine, even before you have received this magazine in the mail and have read this article, you're already steeped in the tensions of preparing for Christmas. Lights are going up, trees are being decorated. Budgets are being blown to get just the right presents. Calendars are filled to bursting with what I hope are joyful occasions of worship, music, family, and food. Our prayer this Advent season is that as we prepare to meet the Christ Child on Christmas Day, we can remember that God set a great deal of time aside to meet us where we are—and God still does that.

Jesus, the one who came down from heaven to earth on Christmas Day, wants you to know the hope, peace, love, and joy that only he can bring to your life and the lives of those that you love. We invite you this November and December to remember that with us in worship, song, and celebration, not just on Sundays, but every day.

## Building community with persons living with disability and their families.

What better place than the community of faith to offer inclusion to all God's people? A place of unconditional respect and value. A place that focuses on our commonalities rather than our differences. Our most obvious commonality

being children of a loving God seeking to deepen that relationship. A community where everybody belongs. A place where all are welcome at the table by the invitation of Jesus. A place to learn and grow that enriches our spiritual formation.



FUMCA is blessed to have a strong and growing ministry of and for persons with disabilities. For many years, families have enjoyed our respite care program known as "First Friday". Our adults

with disabilities are very involved in the Amazing Grace Sunday School Class. Shining Stars reaches out to children with disabilities. Another

highlight of this ministry is Special Needs Vacation Bible School every summer. The newest addition to our outreach efforts is the "A Look Ahead" series.

None of these things could happen without those who support this ministry. The dedicated volunteers involved in these efforts will tell you they are blessed beyond measure; they know the feeling of "being Jesus in skin" to another person. They also know the warmth that comes from the heart of those amazing people they work with. This is evident about the members of our support team; when they are unable to be here, they hate to miss it.

First Friday is designed to provide parents with the opportunity to enjoy "date night" or simply take a break without the expense of childcare. They bring their children with disabilities and their siblings to the church for a night of fun in the gym, arts and crafts, and a movie. During the school year, on the first Friday evening of each month, our team of volunteers will spend time with these children. Each child has a buddy to ensure that their experience is enjoyable and safe.

On Sunday mornings, you will find smiling faces filling the Amazing Grace classroom at 9:30 am. This class of adults is one of the most active groups in our church. They serve in a variety of ways with an emphasis on missions: both fund-raising and hands on projects. As you attend worship, your experience may be blessed with a greeting from one of these adults. Some of them definitely have the spiritual gifts of hospitality and evangelism. At 11:00 am, the Shining Stars class provides a warm, friendly setting for children and youth that includes music, Bible stories and time to be creative.

Special Needs VBS happens in the evening during the same week as children's VBS. This a time when each participant will be supported by an adult volunteer with youth volunteers assisting. Sessions include Bible study, music, arts and crafts, play time and of course, a big favorite: snack time!

A Look Ahead is a free quarterly mini-conference and information series for families and individuals living with disability, the people who support them, and the community at large. This conference series is a collaboration between First United Methodist Church of Arlington, The Arc of Northeast Tarrant County (Arc NETC), Community Now (CN), and Families for Effective Autism Treatment North Texas (FEAT-NT) – all non-profit organizations.

Planning for the future concerns most people, even those who do not live with disability. It can be frightening and overwhelming. And for people living with disability, thinking about the future brings a whole new level of stress and joy others can rarely comprehend.

These conferences are designed to provide information and strategies that empower people

to create the life they dream of: one that offers hope and possibilities that are sometimes thought unattainable. With increased awareness, expectation, and opportunity, individuals who live life with a disability and their families can look ahead and plan for a bright future. The conference also offers an opportunity for participants to connect with others who share similar experiences, hopes, and dreams.

Our first conference was August 8, 2015 and was attended by 150 people with the second one November 14, 2015. Dates for 2016 are the second Saturday of February, May, August, and November. 
**A**s a youth in this church, my favorite event of the summer was our annual youth choir tour. We went to locations all over the country during the years I was a member of Testament. Along the way, we sang in nursing homes, retirement centers, public venues, and churches. Those trips helped shape who I am today. # ANGEL TREE®

IT STARTS WITH A **gift** AND LEADS TO LIVES transformed THROUGH Jesus Christ

**JOE GOT INVOLVED IN DRUGS & GANG VIOLENCE WHEN HE WAS YOUNG.**

Now he's behind bars, but his lifestyle hasn't changed. He's still getting into fights and sneaking drugs. Joe wishes he could shake off the anger and sober up, but he doesn't even know where to begin.

**KATIE WAS RELEASED FROM PRISON THREE MONTHS AGO.**

While incarcerated, she worked hard to become a better person, and now she's ready for a fresh start. But everyone she meets disappears as soon as they find out about her past. Katie wonders, "Why won't anyone give me a chance to prove I've changed?"

**SARAH'S DAD IS IN PRISON HOURS AWAY, AND HER MOM IS STRUGGLING TO MAKE ENDS MEET FOR THEM.**

Sarah sits alone at lunch and on the bus so the other kids won't ask her why they've never seen her dad. She feels so lonely and wonders every day if her dad still loves her. She misses him so much.

**THESE AREN'T JUST STORIES.**

Prison Fellowship meets people in these situations every day. Chances are you've met them too. The 700,000 men and women that our criminal justice system releases from prison each year return to communities around the country—including yours. The numbers are staggering. But this one is particularly overwhelming: **there are 2.7 million children with a parent in prison.**

**WHY HELP THESE KIDS?**

Without your help, Sarah will grow up feeling abandoned and ashamed. But what if things could be different? What if you could give Sarah a gift and a note from her dad so that she knows he still loves and remembers her? Through Prison Fellowship, you can.

On Sunday, November 29, there will be a Christmas tree located outside the main office that has Angel tags that represent a real child who lives somewhere near our church and has an incarcerated parent. They may live with their mom or dad, grandparent, foster family, or extended family and go to school in the Arlington community.

You just pick the tag that appeals to you, shop for the gift (clothing or toy) and return it unwrapped to the church office by the date specified. These children will then come to a party where they hear about the love and grace of Jesus Christ and receive the gifts on behalf of their incarcerated parent. Volunteers will shepherd the families at the party and get to know them. Won't you join us in being part sharing the Good News to these children?






